We have not even managed to drop off food yet as the team that does this has been hit by COVID themselves. We pray they are all safe and hope to get food out in the first week of August.

### CURE hospital



### COVID

Sadly the 3rd wave has hit Zimbabwe badly. This on top of a very cold few weeks has sent our numbers soaring. Even KGVI has not been immune and we had 3 staff test positive. We decided to close our gates for a few days and fumigate offices. Most staff were already locked down at home anyway. We pray for all those who are unwell at KGVI, in Zimbabwe and indeed all over the world. Our vaccination programme is slow with around 10% only having been vaccinated. This with the Chinese vaccines as this is all that is available to us. People are now keen to be vaccinated but we keep running out.

## Teaching



We have to keep thinking of new ways to help. Right now we are giving data to teachers who are able to prepare WhatsApp lessons for those children who have access to phones. The data is too expensive for our very poorly paid teachers to afford.

In fact even if lockdown is lifted teachers may not be able to afford the transport to come back to work! The average salary for a teacher is plus/minus USD 250 a month. Basic transport for a month will cost them USD 240!

# Income Generating Projects




A learning visit to a garden in an old people's home. We are now working with a lady who is expanding urban gardens. She will be giving us advice and further training

## Outpatients

We will be refurbishing our physio room so we can take paying Medical Aid outpatients. In this way we will be able to cover the therapy needed so badly by the KGVI children whose parents struggle to pay therapy fees.

As soon as we can get back to work we will be building our chicken houses ready for this stage of our production. By next year we want to be producing 80% of our own food needs. What a wonderful gift this was!
